Mission and Strategy 1: Journey with Samerth Charitable Trust



Samerth, a non-profit organization, founded in 1992, focuses on improving the conditions of marginalized communities and helping vulnerable communities gain access to their social and economic rights. IDRF's partnership with Samerth started in 2009 to provide a safe and sustainable water supply to the marginalized communities in the arid Kutch district of Gujarat. Since then, IDRF has supported the construction and recharge of water harvesting structures like 92 ponds, check dams, and 11 wells in over 100 villages. This has benefitted over 55,000 people and has led to a considerable decrease in the number of people and cattle migrating from village to village in search of water and employment. With the success of this project, IDRF has expanded the water management program to the water-scarce tribal areas of the Kabirdham district, Chhattisgarh, and provided safe drinking water to more than 4,000 villagers.

Since 2010, IDRF has supported Samerth in the construction of 1,700 *pucca* **toilets** for Below Poverty Line rural families in Kutch to end open defecation and save

women's privacy and dignity. As a result of the excellent execution of this project, Samerth was granted funding from the Government agencies under the Clean India Mission (started in 2014) to scale up the project.

In 2017, IDRF started its support for Samerth *Talim Kendra*- a **daycare center for children with special needs** in Ahmedabad that caters to over 100 students. The center has increased the number of children enrolled, hired better-trained staff, procured better equipment, and improved the quality of services offered. In 2022, IDRF helped set up a **Sensory Room** where sensory, speech, and physiotherapies are conducted.



IDRF has also helped provide **relief kits and livelihood support** to 1,711 victims of floods (2017 and 2018) and Biparjoy Cyclone (2023). During the COVID pandemic, IDRF helped Samerth in setting up **health centers** and providing **food**, **PPE kits**, **medicines**, **oxygen concentrators**, and **vaccines** to more than 15,000 people.



Mission and Strategy 1: Journey with Samerth Charitable Trust



Post-pandemic IDRF helped in the **education recovery** support for 778 children on the verge of dropping out by setting up 20 **learning centers** in remote rural areas and a **digital tablet library** in slums. In addition, 268 persons hit hard by the pandemic were provided **livelihood support** through **microfinance** to set up small-scale enterprises or upgrade agricultural activities such as grocery shops, vegetable carts, vermicomposting, etc. This program helped them sustain and improve their income levels in the 20 to 75% range.

Since 2021, IDRF has provided 500 **Water Wheels** (45-liter containers on wheels) to women's self-help groups, each shared by 3-4 families to fetch water from wells and ponds for household use thus reducing the drudgery and discomfort of carrying heavy water pots on the head.

Over the decades, IDRF has funded various programs across India that facilitate rural enterprises by incorporating clean-energy technology and practices.



In 2022, IDRF started the **Biogas and Reforestation Program** with Samerth and had encouraging results from the 10 **biogas units** installed in Gujarat and Chhattisgarh and the **plantation** of 20,000 saplings in 31 villages of Chhattisgarh.

Since 2022, IDRF has helped **obtain important government documents** like *Aadhar* cards, Voter IDs, and Ration cards, and **open bank accounts** for marginalized *Parkar Koli* community members who work as agricultural laborers or daily wage earners in the Kutch district. This has helped 794 families from 34 villages access government benefits, healthcare, education, and better livelihood opportunities.

IDRF's partnership with Samerth has benefitted more than 85,000 needy people and as we move forward we will continue our support to marginalized communities. In 2024, 50 additional families will be provided **revolving micro-loans** and as a result over the next three years, 363 families will be able to rise above the cycle of poverty.

Mission and Strategy 2:

Improving Foundational Literacy and Numeracy of Children in Grades 1-5

Foundational literacy and numeracy (FLN) refer to basic reading, writing, and mathematics skills that are building blocks of education and are recognized by India's National Education Policy (2020) as a prerequisite for all future schooling and lifelong learning. The Government of India launched the **NIPUN Bharat Mission** which emphasizes the need to attain FLN goals nationally by 2026-27.

IDRF has supported **Bodh Shiksha Samiti, Pratham Education Foundation**, and **Youth for Social Development** in conducting an intensive research-based program by adopting a multi-faceted approach involving, community engagement, teacher training programs, curriculum reforms, government partnerships, and investments in educational infrastructure. The main objective is to **enhance FLN in more than 40,000 children (Grades 1–5) in 5,283 government schools in rural areas and slums in Arunachal Pradesh, Dadar & Nagar Haveli, Daman & Diu, Jharkhand, Maharashtra, Rajasthan, and Odisha.** The program utilizes technology, and innovative teaching methods, creating peer learning clubs, and involving local volunteers and mothers.

A significant improvement in the learning levels of children was seen in the project's first year. The number of children who could read text increased by 49 percentage points in Dadar & Nagar Haveli and Daman & Diu and children who could do arithmetic increased by 34 percentage points in Khunti, Jharkhand.

significant Despite progress in enrollment rates and improved educational infrastructure, there have been challenges in ensuring that children attain these foundational skills due to variations in the quality of education across states, language barriers, socioeconomic disparities, shortages of teachers, lack of training, assessment, and monitoring, etc.

This project will eventually be scaled up in the long term in the other districts based on outcomes, working closely with government departments to ensure that more than 90% of children up to Grade 3 achieve FLN skills.



Highlights of Programs: 2023 1. EDUCATION AND SKILL DEVELOPMENT

Development of Assistive Technology-based Solutions for the Empowerment of Children with Special Needs- Bihar, Maharashtra and Uttarakhand Siddh Divyang Foundation

IDRF is supporting a project for 3 years to provide education and vocational skills to students and health awareness to parents and teachers to detect and identify perinatal developmental delays in babies with the help of technology.



Upgradation of Schools for Children from Marginalized Refugee Communities -Arunachal Pradesh

IDRF has helped in the upgradation of **two rural schools** attended by **872 children** from *Chakma* and *Hajong* communities. The community members were actively involved in the process and provided all manual labor.

Highlights of Programs: 2023 2. HEALTHCARE

Nutritional Supplements for Pregnant Mothers and Healthy Babies- Tamil Nadu Surabi Trust

IDRF helps provide nutrition powder packets for nine months to **1,000 pregnant and lactating mothers** in the low-income suburbs and rural areas of Chennai through the Primary Health Centers. The powder is prepared at a hygienically maintained manufacturing unit certified by the Food Safety and Standards Authority and routinely labtested to maintain high quality.



IDRF has provided nutrition powder packets to 3,542 women since 2016.

Redevelopment of Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy Services at the Hospital-Uttarakhand

Landour Community Hospital

IDRF helped in the purchase of equipment and supplies and infrastructure modification at the 35bed multi-specialty primary and secondary care facility serving local villagers and migrant laborers.

> 780 patients have been treated at the newly upgraded facility.



Highlights of Programs: 2023 3. WOMEN/COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT

Employment, Entrepreneurship, and Health Improvement Initiatives for Women in Hazardous Cigarette (*Bidi*)-rolling Industry- Maharashtra Jnana Prabodhini Solapur

IDRF's support for the **Mukti Campaign** since 2022 has helped

- 8 women with **alternate** employment in paper and cloth bag-making.
- 8 women with tailoring course and sewing machines.
- 336 women with health improvement and deaddiction programs.



Skill Development Training for Underprivileged Youth- Madhya Pradesh Nimar Abhyudaya Rural Management And Development Association (NARMADA)



2023, IDRF provided In operations costs for the Vivekananda Institute of Technology to provide twoyear diploma courses in various trades like plumbing, carpentry, masonry dairy farming, and bookkeeping etc.

42 students trained in various vocational courses per year.

Highlights of Programs: 2023 4. ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY

Construction of Soil and Water Conservation Structures- Maharashtra Prayas Charlotte, USA and Seva Sahayog Foundation



IDRF has supported the construction of continuous contour trenches, gabions, and loose boulder buds to harvest water, prevent runoff, and recharge groundwater levels in Abhone village.

1 million gallons of water harvested in one year benefitted 100–150 farmers in protective irrigation during the dry spells.

Green Energy Project for a Home for Destitute- Rajasthan

Apna Ghar Ashram, Bharatpur

With IDRF's help solar panels were installed on the roof of Apna Ghar Ashram. a home that can accommodate 200 old. sick. abandoned, and destitute persons in Neem Ka Thana. The project covers an area of 28,000 sq feet and provides clean solar energy to ashram, bore-well pumps, the kitchen appliances, etc. This has reduce the electricity helped charges and power outages at the ashram.

Highlights of Programs: 2023 5. GOVERNANCE AND INNOVATION

Empowering a Marginalized Community by Facilitating Access to Entitlement Documents and Government Social Security Schemes- Gujarat Samerth Charitable Trust

Members of the *Parkar Koli* community work as agricultural laborers, or daily wage earners. IDRF has helped provide Aadhar cards, Voter ID, Ration cards, bank accounts, and other documents to **794 families from 34 villages** to access government benefits, healthcare, education and livelihood opportunities to improve their quality of life.



6 Financial Literacy Training Sessions conducted to ensure members make the most of their entitlements.



15 widows have availed of the Widow Pension Scheme.

Preventing and Reducing Gender-based Violence- Rajasthan Partnership for Transparency Fund, USA and Center for Advocacy and Research

IDRF is helping raise awareness about available services and legal resources for women affected by violence. A multi-faced approach has been adopted to benefit **20,500 women in 33 villages** in Ajmer by forming women's forums, setting up resource centers, providing awareness campaigns, strengthening police initiatives, sensitizing boys and men, adopting village-specific micro plans, skill development training, and access to income-generating opportunities.



Annapurna Indira Rasoi

Creates immediate livelihood opportunities for victims, employing them as cooks, kitchen staff, or administrators within the community kitchens.

"Before, I felt isolated and helpless...now I have access to support like healthcare, counseling, and legal aid. These have helped me heal and rebuild my life. I am grateful for your support during my moment of crisis", says a domestic violence survivor.

Highlights of Programs: 2023 6. DISASTER RELIEF AND REHABILITATION

Odisha Train Accident, June

Youth for Social Development and Sri Sathya Sai Trust

IDRF sent relief kits, financial support to families who lost the breadwinners for their children's education and livelihood, and assistance to government officials in rescuing and transferring victims to hospitals, as well as in removing human remains.

- 800 people served meals for seven days.
- 8 severely injured provided cash support.
- 4 nurses hired to support hospital staff.

Fixed Deposits for **10 children** who lost a parent: Annual interest is being transferred to the surviving parent and the entire amount is to be transferred to the child for education and livelihood on reaching maturity.



Gujarat Cyclonic Storm Biparjoy, June Samerth Charitable Trust

1,531 Food Kits 300 Tarpaulin Sheets distributed to displaced families in Kutch dist.

West Bengal Floods, October Economic Rural Development Society IDRF provided groceries to 825 families in 16 villages displaced by floods in Malda dist.

Tamil Nadu Floods, December Swami Vivekananda Rural Development Society

IDRF provided **groceries** to **3,700 families in 10 villages**

displaced by cyclonic floods in Chennai, Kanchipuram, Tiruvallur, and Chengalpet districts.

Project Site Visits in 2023

We encourage our donors, volunteers, and board members to visit the project sites on their trips to India, Nepal, and Sri Lanka. Their feedback helps us make our programs more efficient and effective.

Society for Door Step Schools, Swa-Roopwardhinee, and Vatsalya Trust-Maharashtra

Donor **Malini Joglekar** visited a construction site where the Door Step School bus operates one of its education centers for the children of the laborers. IDRF has helped provide two buses that benefit 1,500 poor children at 21 locations in Pune.

Malini also visited Swa-Roopwardhinee in Pune, where IDRF funds its educational and career-training initiatives for disadvantaged youth and women.

"It was so satisfying to see happiness and joy on the faces of the students and teachers", says Malini.

Malini also visited Vatsalya Trust Mumbai which IDRF has been supporting since 2008 to care for and rehabilitate destitute children through its orphanages, women empowerment and education efforts.





Bodh Shiksha Samiti- Rajasthan

Since 2015, IDRF has supported children's education in the slums and rural areas. Donors **Durgeshnandini and Ashok Gupta** visited the Computer Vocational Training Center, set up with IDRF's support at Bodh's Manas Ganga School for Girls in Jaipur.

"The computer teachers we met seemed very competent and confident. Interaction with girls led me to believe that the IDRF contributions are well utilized to transform the lives of so many underprivileged girls excited and motivated to enter the digital world", says Durgeshnandini.

They also visited three rural *Bodhshalas* where IDRF is supporting the Foundational Literacy and Numeracy program in partnership with the state government.

IDRF is also extending collaboration with several US-based 501(c)(3) organizations to amplify the resources and expertise available to benefit the underserved communities in India.

IDRF's partnership for a million-dollar project to bridge the urban/rural digital divide for rural India's school children.

In a landmark partnership with the S M Sehgal Foundation, Teach for Life and Guru Krupa Foundation, **51 digital libraries** are to be launched in villages in **Andhra Pradesh**, **Haryana, Karnataka, Maharashtra, Rajasthan**, and **Telangana**. Project *Umeed* will provide 16,000 students in 51 government schools access to computers, internet connectivity, educational software, and digital learning resources. This is a 3-year project (2024-2027) and IDRF will contribute \$600,000.



Aftercare program for youth aging out of care homes.

IDRF's partnership with A Future for Every Child, USA, and Catalyst for Social Action, India, will support 55 youth in **Karnataka** who have grown up in orphanages with aftercare programs to serve as a launchpad for adulthood. The care leavers will be provided career counseling, financial support for vocational training/higher education, life skills training, and mentoring for two years after employment to ensure they are on a stable path to a successful future. This is a two-year project and will cost \$40,000. <u>More details.</u>

Skill Development and Women Empowerment Centers for the unemployed and underprivileged.

To assist in establishing the two facilities in **Andhra Pradesh**, IDRF is working in partnership with the Kakinada Engineering Alumni Trust for Service (KEATS) in India and the USA. Every year, 140 jobless youth from rural areas will receive training in the fields of healthcare, technology, data analysis, artificial intelligence, machine learning, etc. at the **Skill Development Center**. The cost to provide equipment and furniture for computer labs, classrooms, dormitories, generators, revolving funds, etc. is \$98,000.

Forty impoverished and unskilled rural women will be trained annually to work at the **Women Empowerment Center**. They will receive training to make pickles, chutneys, dosas, idli mixes, and other products using local ingredients. IDRF will provide \$40,000 for food processing equipment and revolving money, enabling women from the surrounding districts to break free from the cycle of poverty and support their families.
